### HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

<<(c) Surfaces--

(3) Cleaning. Hard surfaces with which nonhuman primates come in contact must be spot-cleaned daily and sanitized in accordance with Sec. 3.84 of this subpart to prevent accumulation of excreta or disease hazards... All other surfaces of housing facilities must be cleaned and sanitized when necessary to satisfy generally accepted husbandry standards and practices. Sanitization may be done by any of the methods provided in Sec. 3.84(b)(3) of this subpart for primary enclosures.>>

Several enclosures housing nonhuman primates had an accumulation of cobwebs on the surfaces of the enclosures.

--The enclosure housing 2 Geoffrey's marmosets with 2 agoutis and 1 Linnaeus sloth had an accumulation of cobwebs in the skylight.

--The enclosure housing 4 common marmosets had an accumulation of cobwebs in the skylight and around the ceiling near the viewing window.

--The enclosure housing 2 cotton-topped tamarins had an accumulation of cobwebs in the skylight.

--The enclosure housing 1 golden-lion tamarin with 1 prehensile-tailed porcupine had an accumulation of cobwebs in the skylight and around the viewing window.

--The enclosure housing 2 red-handed tamarins had an accumulation of cobwebs in the skylight and around the ceiling.

Cobwebs are created by spiders and indicate that cleaning of all surfaces in these nonhuman primate enclosures has not been done frequently enough to prevent them from accumulating. These cobwebs harbor pests and collect debris which may pose a risk to the health of the animals.

Surfaces which come into contact with nonhuman primates must be spot-cleaned daily and all surfaces in their enclosures shall be cleaned and sanitized as often as necessary to prevent accumulation of excreta and disease hazards.

### PRIMARY ENCLOSURES.

<< (a) General requirements.

(2) Primary enclosures must be constructed and maintained so that they: (ix) Enable all surfaces in contact with nonhuman primates to be readily cleaned and sanitized in accordance with Sec. 3.84(b)(3) of this subpart, or replaced when worn or soiled;>>

At least 2 enclosures housing nonhuman primates had areas where the surfaces were no longer able to be readily cleaned and sanitized.

--The enclosure housing 2 Geoffrey's marmosets with 2 agoutis and 1 Linnaeus sloth had an area approximately 5 inches in diameter in the skylight which had exposed dry wall, which cannot be adequately cleaned or sanitized as it is not impervious to moisture.

--The enclosure housing 4 common marmosets had several areas where the paint was peeling and exposing unsealed surfaces, which cannot be adequately cleaned or sanitized.

Surfaces that cannot be readily cleaned and sanitized allow excreta, food waste, and other debris to accumulate on the surfaces, posing a risk to the health of the animals.

Primary enclosures for nonhuman primates must be constructed and maintained so that surfaces in contact with the animals can be readily cleaned and sanitized or replaced when worn or soiled.

This was a focused inspection to check the health and welfare of the lions, jaguar, tigers, small mammals, education animals, nursery animals, giraffes, and petting zoo animals.
